Scenario

Marble Garden Centre



Marble Garden Centre sells plants and gardening equipment to the public. The manager of **Marble Garden Centre** has decided to commission a new computerised system to store details about the centre's products.

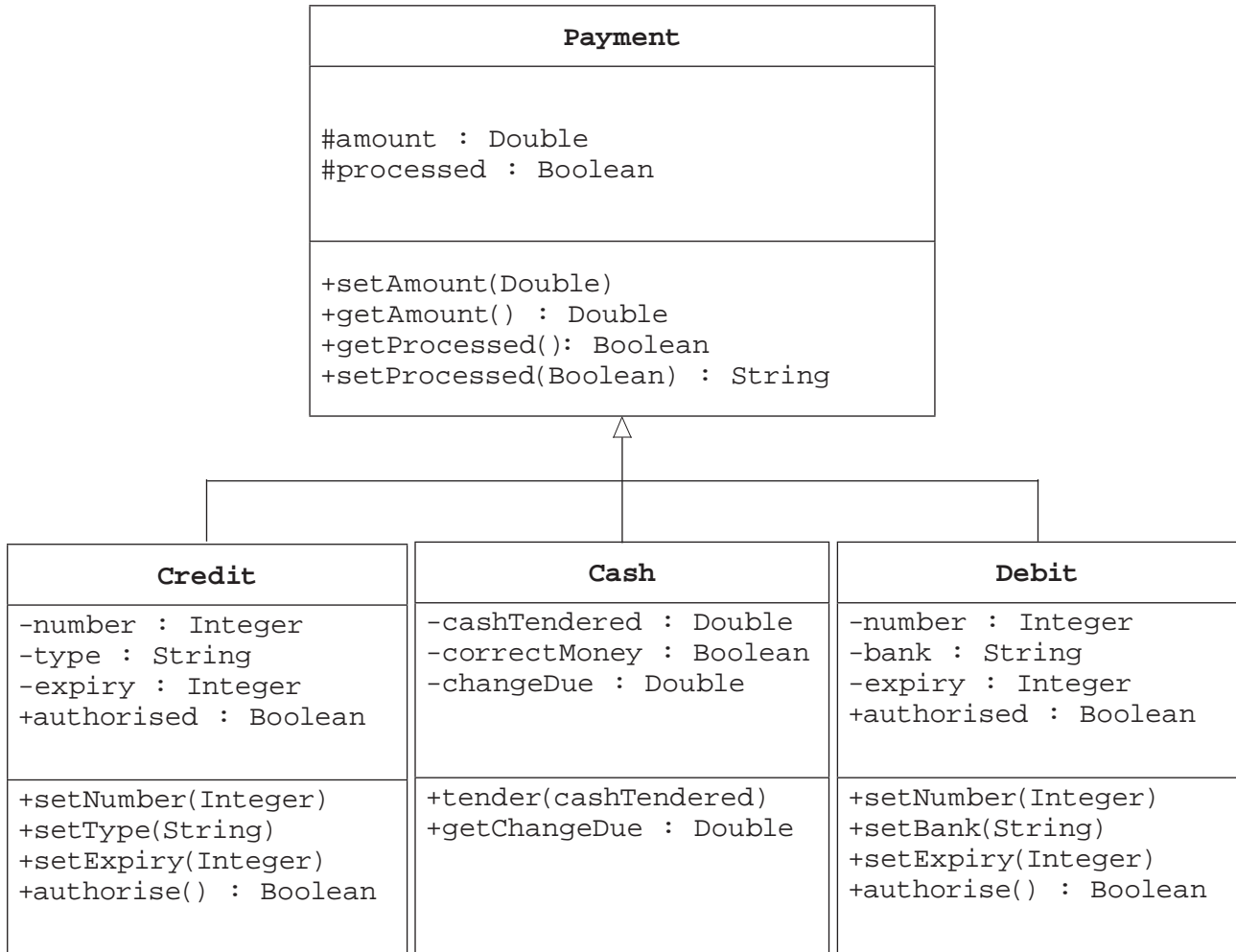
The garden centre would also like to start a customer loyalty programme and so would like to store customer details on the computerised system.

Marble Garden Centre already stores product details on an older system. These details include productID, productLocation, productName, productDescription and productPrice.

The garden centre intends to store customer details such as customer ID, first name, surname, postcode, date of birth and number of points collected.

You have been commissioned to develop a prototype computer system.

1. The following partially complete class diagram represents the relationships between some of the classes that **Marble Garden Centre** will need for their payment processing system.



- (a) State the name of an identifier for a subclass of `Payment`. [1]
- (b) State the return data type for the method `setProcessed`. [1]
- (c) State the name of the most appropriate identifier for a variable that is used to store the following:
- (i) `TRUE` [1]
 - (ii) `9.99` [1]
- (d) Explain the significance and implications of the `#` symbol in the attribute `#processed : Boolean` in the class `Payment`. [2]
- (e) An object called `transaction1` is instantiated from the class `Credit`.
Applying the concept of inheritance, list **all** of the methods that would be contained within the object `transaction1`. [2]
- (f) An object called `transaction2` is instantiated from the class `Cash`.
Applying the concept of inheritance, list **all** of the attributes that would be accessible within the object `transaction2`. [2]
- (g) Explain why the attribute `amount` is situated within the class `Payment`. [2]

Save your work for Question 1 as a word processed document named Question 1.

2. **Marble Garden Centre** has decided to store customer details in a database table. Copy and complete the following data structure table. [5]

3. **Marble Garden Centre** is considering the best way to introduce the new computerised system. Describe two different methods of changeover available to the garden centre. Identify the most suitable method for this situation and give a reason.

4. **Marble Garden Centre** tracks the growth of its plants carefully. They take measurements of the growth at regular intervals and enter the values into an algorithm. The algorithm outputs feedback on the measurements.

- (b) Using a recognised convention, design an algorithm to help **Marble Garden Centre** control the temperature within one of its greenhouses.

The algorithm should repeatedly accept an input called `currentTemp`, the current temperature within the greenhouse in degrees Celsius ($^{\circ}\text{C}$).

The algorithm should attempt to maintain the temperature in the greenhouse between 20°C and 24°C .

- When the temperature rises above 24°C the algorithm should output “open the windows and deactivate heater”.
- When the temperature rises above 26°C the algorithm should output “activate fans”.
- When the temperature falls below 20°C the algorithm should output “de-activate fans and close windows”.
- When the temperature falls below 18°C the algorithm should output “activate heater”.

The algorithm should output the current temperature and average temperature each time a reading is taken.

If the temperature is above 50°C or below -20°C , the algorithm should output a message warning **Marble Garden Centre** that the temperature input is outside acceptable limits and terminate running.

Your algorithm should be written using self-documenting identifiers.
