Explain the account of the birth of the historical Buddha. [15] (a) 'Stories about the Buddha are not meant to be taken literally.' (b) Evaluate this view. [15] Or, 4. Examine features of the Buddha's awakening under the Bodhi tree. [15] (a) 'The Buddha's awakening is the most important event in Buddhism.' (b) Evaluate this view. [15] Or, 5. Explain the role and importance of dana (giving) in Buddhism. [15] (a) 'Punya (merit) depends on dana (giving).' (b) Evaluate this view. [15]
